A Scheduling Note

During the week beginning November 13, the Holy Synod of Bishops of the Orthodox Church in America met, as they do twice a year. During the same week, by means of an announcement made on Monday, November 13, His Beatitude, Metropolitan TIKHON, with the other members of the Holy Synod of Bishops, made a request that all Orthodox Church in America parishes take a collection in support of the OCA Stewards program on Sunday, November 19. In our Parish, with the knowledge of His Eminence, Archbishop NIKON, we are postponing that collection for OCA Stewards to a date in the future. We are doing this because we already had a collection for International Christian Charities (IOCC) prepared for and scheduled for the Sunday before Thanksgiving.

OCA Stewards (much like ONE Stewards in the Diocese of New England) supports program work for causes such as evangelization, youth work, and the publication of liturgical texts. It is a worthy cause. News and Notes...

Sunday, November 19: Waterbury Parish Annual General Meeting: The Waterbury Parish Annual General Meeting is taking place on Sunday, November 19. Therefore, Fr. John will be leaving Terryville immediately following the conclusion of the Sunday morning Divine Liturgy on November 19 in order to travel to Nativity of the Holy Virgin Mary Church, Waterbury, so that he can chair that meeting in his capacity as Pastoral Administrator of that Parish.

Monday, November 20: Feast of the Entrance of the Mother of God into the Temple: This week we will celebrate one of the great feasts of the Church Year, the Entrance of the Mother of God, the Virgin Mary, into the Temple at Jerusalem. This feast commemorates the occasion when, as a small child, the Virgin Mary was enrolled by her parents to be one of the young women who served as temple handmaidens at the Temple in Jerusalem. The Temple was the central shrine of the Jewish people, those people who worshipped the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, the God whom we are privileged today to call "Our Father." In our Parish, we will mark this feast with the celebration of Vespers with Divine Liturgy on the Eve of the Feast, Monday, November 20, beginning at 6:15 PM. Please, make an effort to participate.

Advent Confession Appointments: The Nativity Fast (Advent) lasts for the forty days from November 15 until the celebration of The Nativity (Birth) of our Lord, Christmas, on December 25. Each of us should observe the Fast in an appropriate manner. Besides keeping the Fast, we should all make, prepare for and keep an appointment to take part in the Sacrament of Personal and Private Confession. Fr. John hears Confessions by appointment. Please contact Fr. John now to make your appointment. Thank you for your cooperation!

Special Basket Collection to Benefit our Seminaries: On Sunday, December 3, we will be having a "Special Basket" Collection at the conclusion of the Divine Liturgy to benefit the three seminaries of the Orthodox Church in America: Saint Vladimir's Seminary, Crestwood (Yonkers), New York; Saint Tikhon's Seminary, South Canaan, Pennsylvania; and Saint Herman's Seminary, Kodiak, Alaska. In our 2017 Parish Budget we have an expenditure line item for the support of our seminaries. This planned collection will help meet that line item. That line item is \$1270.00, which is (roughly) about one percent (1%) of our annual income budget for 2017. The Orthodox Church in America, by means of a formal resolution passed at the Seattle All-American Council several years ago, has asked every parish to pledge 1% of their annual income each year towards the support of the seminaries. In terms of breaking down our donation between the three schools, we are planning to send 40% of our total donation to Saint Vladimir's Seminary, 40% to Saints Tikhon's Seminary, and 20% to Saint Herman's Seminary.

Choir Rehearsals during the Nativity Fast: On Saturday nights throughout the month of December leading up to the Feast of Christmas, we will be having Choir Rehearsals following the conclusion of the Vigil service, in order to prepare for the Feast.

Advent Vespers, Wednesday evenings in December: On Wednesday evenings in December, during the several weeks leading up to the Feast of the Nativity of our Lord (Christmas), we will celebrate Daily Vespers beginning at 7:00 PM. This has been our custom for many years now and is an edifying part of our liturgical preparations to celebrate the Feast.

Annual Terryville "Christmas Walk", Sunday December 3: The annual Terryville Christmas Walk is scheduled for Sunday, December 3, 2017, beginning at 3:00 PM and ending at about 6:00 PM. Listed in order of visitation, the seven participating local Christian communities this year are: Immaculate Conception Roman Catholic Church, Holy Trinity Lutheran Church, Saint Paul's Lutheran Church, Saint Casimir's Roman Catholic Church, Saint Michael's Ukrainian Catholic Church, Saints Cyril and Methodius Orthodox Church, and Terryville Congregational Church. NOTE: This year Fr. John will NOT be requiring the participation of the Choir for this event. Rather, he will be preparing a simple service that he will be able to perform on his own or, perhaps, with a few willing volunteers.

Annual "Visit of St. Nicholas", Sunday, December 10: On Sunday, December 10, during the Coffee Hour after the conclusion of the Divine Liturgy, our children (with all of us!) will enjoy the Annual "Visit of St. Nicholas" to the Parish.

Readings from Holy Scripture

Scripture Readings for the 24th Sunday after Pentecost, this year November 19

The Reading from the Epistle of the Holy Apostle Paul to the Ephesians (Ephesians 2:14-22)

Brothers and Sisters: Christ Jesus is our peace, who has made us both one, and has broken down the dividing wall of hostility, by abolishing in his flesh the law of commandments and ordinances, that he might create in himself one new man in place of the two, so making peace, and might reconcile us both to God in one body through the cross, thereby bringing the hostility to an end. And he came and preached peace to you who were far off and peace to those who were near; for through him we both have access in one Spirit to the Father. So then you are no longer strangers and sojourners, but you are fellow citizens with the saints and members of the household of God, built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Christ Jesus himself being the cornerstone, in whom the whole structure is joined together and grows into a holy temple in the Lord; in whom you also are built into it for a dwelling place of God in the Spirit.

The Reading from the Gospel according to St. Luke (Luke 12:16-21)

The Lord spoke this parable, "The land of a rich man brought forth plentifully; and he thought to himself, 'What shall I do, for I have nowhere to store my crops?' And he said, 'I will do this: I will pull down my barns, and build larger ones; and there I will store all my grain and my goods. And I will say to my soul, Soul, you have ample goods laid up for many years; take your ease, eat, drink, be merry.' But God said to him, 'Fool! This night your soul is required of you; and the things you have prepared, whose will they be?' So is he who lays up treasure for himself, and is not rich toward God." As he said this, Jesus called out, "He who has ears to hear, let him hear."

Scripture Readings for the 25th Sunday after Pentecost, this year November 26

The Reading from the Epistle of the Holy Apostle Paul to the Ephesians (Ephesians 4:1-6)

Brothers and Sisters: I therefore, a prisoner for the Lord, beg you to lead a life worthy of the calling to which you have been called, with all lowliness and meekness, with patience, forbearing one another in love, eager to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope that belongs to your call, one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of us all, who is above all and through all and in all.

The Reading from the Gospel according to St. Luke (Luke 13:10-17)

At that time Jesus was teaching in one of the synagogues on the sabbath. And there was a woman who had had a spirit of infirmity for eighteen years; she was bent over and could not fully straighten herself. And when Jesus saw her, he called her and said to her, "Woman, you are freed from your infirmity." And he laid his hands upon her, and immediately she was made straight, and she praised God. But the ruler of the synagogue, indignant because Jesus had healed on the sabbath, said to the people, "There are six days on which work ought to be done; come on those days and be healed, and not on the sabbath day." Then the Lord answered him, "You hypocrites! Does not each of you on the sabbath untie his ox or his ass from the manger, and lead it away to water it? And ought not this woman, a daughter of Abraham whom Satan bound for eighteen years, be loosed from this bond on the sabbath day?" As Jesus said this, all his adversaries were put to shame; and all the people rejoiced at all the glorious things that were done by him.
