Questions coming out of our recent Parish Council Meetings

During our last several Parish Council Meetings, the Parish Council, and others who have joined the meetings, have been considering the issue of Church Growth and Development. One of the initiatives that has been suggested is that we have an "Open House" (or similar event) at Church, an occasion to which we can invite acquaintances in order to share with them about our Faith and our Church.

One of the concerns, when considering how to prepare and to host such an event, is that we would want to ensure that the event be organized in such a way that we would actually feel comfortable with it, ourselves. We certainly do not want to set up an event to which we would not want to invite friends and family. Rather, we want to arrange an event that is an occasion that we would want to share with and participate in with others, those who might not know much or anything about the Orthodox Faith and Church.

So, we are asking for feedback; and may soon do so in a more formal manner, by means of a survey or questionnaire. But, in the meantime, we would like to ask ourselves to think about these questions (and more): What sort of event at Church would we feel comfortable inviting non-Orthodox acquaintances to attend? How would that event be structured? When would it take place? How long would it last? Who would organize and host the event, and what specifically would be the content of the occasion? Why would we be hosting such an event? What specifically would be its goals?

Please, do take some time to think about these questions, and to provide some feedback to our Parish Council members, and, especially, to Richard Koski, our Parish Secretary, so that Rich can compile some of the responses he receives to share with the Parish Council. John has been the Pastoral Administrator of the Waterbury Parish since December 2016.)

LOOKING AHEAD: The Feast of Saints Cyril and Methodius: We will mark the Feast of our heavenly patrons, Saints Cyril and Methodius, with the celebration of Vespers with the Divine Liturgy beginning at 6:15 PM on Thursday evening, May 10, the Eve of the Feast.

LOOKING AHEAD: Youth Rally, August 13-18, 2018: The Year 2018 Annual Diocesan Youth Rally will take place August 13-18, 2018. Youth Rally is open to all Diocesan Youth who have finished 5th grade and who have not yet celebrated their 18th birthday. Volunteer Adult Staff Members are required to make this event possible. Staff Members will arrive a day early, on Sunday evening, August 12, and stay the entire week. For further information, please contact Fr. Needs of the Food Pantry: On an almost constant basis, for the purpose of distribution to its clients, the Plymouth Community Food Pantry needs personal care items such as shampoo, soap, toothpaste, deodorant, toothbrushes, hair brushes, etc. Also, the Food Pantry just about always requires donations of condiments and spices, such as ketchup, mustard, vinegar, cooking oil, BBQ sauce, pickle relish, table salt, black pepper, onion and garlic powder, dried herbs, etc. You can drop off your donations in the basket in the Narthex of our Church, or in the big green bin located by the exit staircase in the Church Basement Social Hall. Every time any of us goes grocery shopping, it would be appropriate and worthy of a blessing for us to purchase some items for donation to the Food Pantry.

Upcoming Event in a Neighboring Orthodox Christian Parish: On Saturday, May 5, 2018, at Christ the Savior Orthodox Church, Southbury, CT, Fr. Paul Tarazi will offer a pair of lectures based on his new book, *The Rise of Scripture*, which is about how the Bible, as we have it today, became recognized as Holy Scripture. This is part of the long-running *Connecticut Bible Lecture Series* that Christ the Savior Church has hosted for many years. Readings from Holy Scripture

Scripture Readings for the Third Sunday of Pascha, called the Sunday of the Holy Myrrhbearers

The Reading from the Acts of the Holy Apostles (Acts 6:1-7)

At that time, when the disciples were increasing in number, the Hellenists murmured against the Hebrews because their widows were neglected in the daily distribution. And the twelve summoned the body of the disciples and said, "It is not right that we should give up preaching the word of God to serve tables. Therefore, brethren, pick out from among you seven men of good repute, full of the Spirit and of wisdom, whom we may appoint to this duty. But we will devote ourselves to prayer and to the ministry of

the word." And what they said pleased the whole multitude, and they chose Stephen, a man full of faith and of the Holy Spirit, and Philip, and Prochorus, and Nicanor, and Timon, and Parmenas, and Nicolaus, a proselyte of Antioch. These they set before the apostles, and they prayed and laid their hands upon them. And the word of God increased; and the number of the disciples multiplied greatly in Jerusalem, and a great many of the priests were obedient to the faith.

The Reading from the Gospel according to St. Mark (Mk. 15:43-16:8)

At that time, Joseph of Arimathea, a respected member of the council, who was also himself looking for the kingdom of God, took courage and went to Pilate, and asked for the body of Jesus. And Pilate wondered if he were already dead; and summoning the centurion, he asked him whether Jesus was already dead. And when he learned from the centurion that he was dead, he granted the body to Joseph. And he bought a linen shroud, and taking him down, wrapped him in the linen shroud, and laid him in a tomb which had been hewn out of the rock; and he rolled a stone against the door of the tomb. Mary Magdalene and Mary the mother of Joses saw where he was laid. And when the Sabbath was past, Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James, and Salome, bought spices, so that they might go and anoint him. And very early on the first day of the week they went to the tomb when the sun had risen. And they were saying to one another, "Who will roll away the stone for us from the door of the tomb?" And looking up, they saw that the stone was rolled back--it was very large. And entering the tomb, they saw a young man sitting on the right side, dressed in a white robe; and they were amazed. And he said to them, "Do not be amazed; you seek Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has risen, he is not here; see the place where they laid him. But go, tell his disciples and Peter that he is going before you to Galilee; there you will see him, as he told you." And they went out and fled from the tomb; for trembling and astonishment had come upon them; and they said nothing to any one, for they were afraid.
