Former Pastor (1977 to 1990) Fr. Michael Koblosh falls asleep in the Lord. Memory Eternal!

The Mitred Archpriest Michael Koblosh, who was Pastor of our Parish from 1977 to 1990, fell asleep in the Lord this past week, on Wednesday, August 18, 2021. His funeral took place at the mission parish he was serving (even while retired) in Alexandria, Virginia, on Thursday evening and Friday morning, August 19 and 20. Our parish was represented at those services by Protodeacon Paul Nimchek and Patty Nimchek. Fr. Michael was buried at Saint Tikhon's Monastery in South Canaan, Pennsylvania, on Saturday morning, August 21. Our Parish was represented at Fr. Michael's burial by Fr. John Hopko, Fr. David Koles, and the Nimchek Family. Fr. Michael is buried yards away from Fr. Vladimir Sovyrda, the late husband of our fellow parishioner, Matushka Ann Sovyrda. Also, buried nearby are a number of members of Fr. John Hopko's family, including his grandparents, Fr. Alexander and Matushka Juliana Schmemann.

Fr. John Hopko wrote this letter, which was read at the funeral services for Fr. Michael:

Here at Saints Cyril and Methodius Orthodox Church, Terryville, Connecticut, we are deeply saddened to be informed of the falling asleep in the Lord of the Mitred Archpriest Michael Koblosh. Fr. Michael was, of course, Pastor here from 1977 to 1990.

Fr. Michael was and remains a "giant" here in Terryville. In so many ways, the good things that happen here in the Terryville Parish to this very moment are built on the foundation set by Fr. Michael. We are grateful to him and for him every day.

Readings from Holy Scripture

Readings for the Ninth Sunday after Pentecost

The Reading from the First Letter of the Holy Apostle Paul to the Corinthians (1 Cor. 3:9-17)

Brothers and Sisters: We are God's fellow workers; you are God's field, God's building. According to the grace of God given to me, like a skilled master builder I laid a foundation, and another man is building upon it. Let each man take care how he builds upon it. For no other foundation can any one lay than that which is laid, which is Jesus Christ. Now if any one builds on the foundation with gold, silver, precious stones, wood, hay, straw—each man's work will become manifest; for the Day will disclose it, because it will be revealed with fire, and the fire will test what sort of work each one has done. If the work which any man has built on the foundation survives, he will receive a reward. If any man's work is burned up, he will suffer loss, though he himself will be saved, but only as through fire. Do you not know that you are God's temple and that God's Spirit dwells in you? If any one destroys God's temple, God will destroy him. For God's temple is holy, and that temple you are.

The Reading from the Gospel according to St. Matthew (Matt. 14:22-34)

At that time, Jesus made his disciples get into the boat and go before him to the other side, while he dismissed the crowds. And after he had dismissed the crowds, he went up on the mountain by himself to pray. When evening came, he was there alone, but the boat by this time was many furlongs distant from the land, beaten by the waves; for the wind was against them. And in the fourth watch of the night Jesus came to them, walking on the sea. But when the disciples saw him walking on the sea, they were terrified, saying, "It is a ghost!" And they cried out for fear. But immediately Jesus spoke to them, saying, "Take heart, it is I; have no fear." And Peter answered him, "Lord, if it is you, bid me come to you on the water." Jesus said, "Come." So Peter got out of the boat and walked on the water and came to Jesus; but when he saw the wind, he was afraid, and beginning to sink he cried out, "Lord, save me." Jesus immediately reached out his hand and caught him, saying to him, "O man of little faith, why did you doubt?" And when they got into the boat, the wind ceased. And those in the boat worshiped Jesus, saying, "Truly you are the Son of God." And when they had crossed over, they came to land at Gennesaret.

Readings for the Tenth Sunday after Pentecost

The Reading from the First Epistle of the Holy Apostle Paul to the Corinthians (1 Cor. 4:9-16)

Brothers and Sisters: I think that God has exhibited us apostles as last of all, like men sentenced to death; because we have become a spectacle to the world, to angels and to men. We are fools for Christ's sake, but you are wise in Christ. We are weak, but you are strong. You are held in honor, but we in disrepute. To the present hour we hunger and thirst, we are ill-clad and buffeted and homeless, and we labor, working with our own hands. When reviled, we bless; when persecuted, we endure; when slandered, we try to conciliate; we have become, and are now, as the refuse of the world, the off-scouring of all things. I do not write this to make you ashamed, but to admonish you as my beloved children. For though you have countless guides in Christ, you do not have many fathers. For I became your father in Christ Jesus through the gospel. I urge you, then, be imitators of me.

The Reading from the Gospel according to Saint Matthew (Matt. 17:14-23)

At that time a man came up to Jesus and kneeling before him said, "Lord, have mercy on my son, for he is an epileptic and he suffers terribly; for often he falls into the fire, and often into the water. And I brought him to your disciples, and they could not heal him." And Jesus answered, "O faithless and perverse generation, how long am I to be with you? How long am I to bear with you? Bring him here to me." And Jesus rebuked him, and the demon came out of him, and the boy was cured instantly. Then the disciples came to Jesus privately and said, "Why could we not cast it out?" He said to them, "Because you have no faith. For truly, I say to you, if you have faith as a grain of mustard seed, you will say to this mountain, 'Move from here to there,' and it will move; and nothing will be impossible to you. This kind never comes out except by prayer and fasting." As they were traveling together through Galilee, Jesus said to them, "The Son of man is to be delivered into the hands of men, and they will kill him, and he will be raised on the third day.
